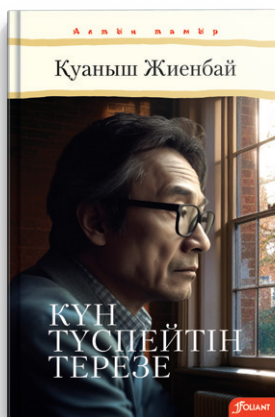

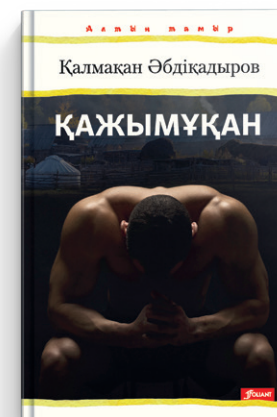

The story unfolds around how a nameless shepherd named Shirak, who is in love with the queen, manages to halt Darius’s vast army.

THE GIANTS. DALAIYA

The events of the trilogy "Giants" unfold from the mid-6th century BC to the 1st century BC across a vast region that encompasses ancient Persia, classical Greece, and ancient Egypt. However, the focus is primarily on the land of the nomadic Saka tribes, who inhabited what is now Kazakhstan, later invaded by the Hunnic forces.

The first book, "Dalaiya," tells the story of the Saka woman Dalaiya, a former ward of Queen Tomiris, over nearly twenty-five years. Throughout this time, she experiences various trials and tribulations, leading her to meet her future husband, the Urartian mercenary Rus, who is captured by her people. Together, they have a son, Dantal, whom Dalaiya saves by entrusting his fate to her friend, the Greek Forcus.

THE GIANTS. DANTAL

The second book, "Dantal," focuses on the life of Dantal, the son of Dalaiya, who from a young age is under the care of the Greek Forcus, who becomes like an older brother to him. Together, they participate in a Persian expedition to the mysterious land of Kush, located beyond the southern borders of Egypt. Dantal returns to the mountain fortress where his parents were buried and eventually arrives back in the land of the Saka.

Amidst tumultuous events, he becomes the king of the Masaget tribes, marrying the daughter of a Greek merchant, Prêtas, named Aritia, known among the nomadic subjects as the golden-haired princess. As a reformer, Dantal leads a vibrant life filled with bloody wars against invading forces, constructs cities and fortresses on the sacred land, promotes trade, and implements numerous other reforms. He conquers tribes related to the Tigrakhauda and ultimately passes power to his seven sons. Throughout his life, he strives to maintain a connection with Forcus, who remains on their native island of Samothrace, becoming a merchant and assisting Dantal with caravans of weapons.

THE GIANTS. DASSARIJA

The third book, "Dassarija," focuses on the life of Dassarija, the great-grandson of Dalaiya and grandson of Dantal, who leads his people during difficult years of drought and famine. Dassarija faces the hordes of Alexander the Great and, after Alexander's departure from Central Asia to India, engages in a thirteen-year war against the Hunnic chanyu Motun, who brings his forces from Inner Asia into the land of the Saka.

Dassarija maintains a friendship with Timaeus, a descendant of the Greek Forcus, who arrives in his lands as part of Alexander's army. Together, they fight side by side against the Huns. After their battles, Dassarija sends Timaeus back to his homeland, the island of Samothrace, with a caravan. Dassarija's son, King Divonna, ultimately becomes the last ruler of the free Saka Massagets.
